8. CHURCH LEADERS COMMENT ON NATION'S FINANCIAL CRISIS: As the U.S. Congress grappled with a financial services industry bail-out package late last week, leaders in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) took part in the national debate, sending letters to Presbyterians and to Congress. The Presbyterian Washington Office Oct. 6 published background and analysis of the crisis, including General Assembly policy germane to the crisis and its fallout. The full text of the Presbyterian Washington Office background paper, written by Leslie Woods, associate for domestic poverty and

environmental issues: "In response to ailing financial markets and the collapse of a number of large investment banks and AIG, the American International Group, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Paulson arrived on Capitol Hill on Saturday, Sept. 20, with the Administration's proposal to stabilize the tottering financial market. 9. GAC HEARS FROM PDA ABOUT 40 EFFORTS: The unprecedented relief efforts of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance in response to more

than 40 "events" that have affected nearly one-quarter of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) presbyteries were much on the mind of the Justice Committee of the General Assembly Council in Snowbird, Utah, Oct. 1. Sara Lisherness, director of Compassion, Peace and Justice Ministries — which includes PDA — updated the committee on responses to devastating flooding in the Midwest in the spring and hurricane recovery in the aftermath of four summer hurricanes that wreaked havoc in Texas and Louisiana as well as Caribbean island nations such as Haiti and Cuba. MASSIVE APPEAL LAUNCHED FOR STORM RECOVERY: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, with backing from its parent General Assembly Council, has issued a national appeal to Presbyterians to support relief efforts in 40 presbyteries that have suffered extensive damage from devastating storms so far in 2008. PDA has sent letters to all 189 middle governing bodies of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and all 11,200 PC(USA) congregations announcing the appeal. ... "These four storms (Fay, Gustav, Hanna and Ike) have created an immediate need of \$700,000," Synod of the Sunexecutive Judy Fletcher told a gathering of middle governing body staff and GAC members in Snowbird, Utah, Sept. 30. 11. MIDDLE GOVERNING BODY LEADERS PONDER POLITY ISSUES: In their first gathering since the 218th General Assembly in San Jose, Calif., middle governing body leaders of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) received denominational updates and pondered strategies for leading their organizations calmly and courageously during a time of change. The annual Polity Conference was held Sept. 24 – 26 at Snowbird, Utah. Of particular interest to the presbytery staff and stated clerks in attendance were discussions related to upcoming votes in the presbyteries on proposed amendments to the constitution of the PC (USA). Other topics included property issues when congregations seek to withdraw from the denomination; presbytery examinations of prospective Ministers of Word and Sacrament; the transformation of funding systems within the PC(USA); immigration issues; and new changes in proposed revisions to the PC(USA) Form of Government. MIDDLE GOVERNING BODY LEADERS FIND HOPE IN ANXIOUS TIMES: "We are living in a time during which things change so rapidly that we are always behind the eight-ball," Peter Steinke told the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) 2008 Polity Conference on Church Leadership During Anxious Times. Steinke is widely recognized as an expert in helping church leaders understand the complexities of family systems theory as a way to develop healthier congregations. He has also served as a parish pastor, an educator, and a therapist for clergy. He is the author of the best-selling books *How Your Church Family Works* and *Healthy Congregations*. 14. GAC/MGB CONSULTATION PRODUCES AGREEMENT: Three years into intense conversations about how to rebuild relationships between the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s General Assembly Council — the 2.2 million-member denomination's church wide mission agency — and the denomination's 199 middle governing bodies, the third annual gathering here this week has produced "An Invitation to Renew Our Commitment and Mission Together." The three-page document, hammered out by a five-person writing team after two days of conversation, outlines: the PC(USA)'s "missional heritage;" "confession" of shortcomings that have characterized the relationship between the GAC and middle governing bodies in recent years; identification of the "cultural context" in which the church seeks to serve today; and themes, values and challenges of the ministry and mission the two groups seek to do together. 15. PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER ACQUITTED IN WEDDING CASE: The Rev. Janet Edwards, a Presbyterian minister in Pittsburgh, was found not guilty Oct. 2 following a trial on charges that she violated Scripture and the constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) when she presided at the marriage of two women. The nine-member Permanent Judicial Commission of Pittsburgh Presbytery unanimously ruled that the constitutions of the PC(USA) and the state of Pennsylvania define marriage as an act between a man and a woman. 16. 'JOINING HEARTS & HANDS' RAISED \$30 MILLION: The Mission Initiative: Joining Hearts and Hands — a star-crossed five-year campaign to raise \$40 million for new overseas mission workers and new church developments in this country, particularly new immigrant congregations — wrapped up with more than \$30 million raised, honorary campaign chair Tom Gillespie told the General Assembly Council in Snowbird, Utah, Oct. 2. The campaign, launched by the 2002 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), became a six-year campaign that was plagued throughout by staff

INTEREST BUILDS AROUND 'BIG TENT' EVENT: "Join us at the Big Tent!" the General Assembly Council's director of Evangelism and Church Growth Eric Hoey urged council members at their fall meeting in Snowbird, Utah, Sept. 30-Oct. 3. Hoey introduced the event and played a short video promoting it. "Big Tent" is a first-of-its-kind event scheduled for June 11-13 in Atlanta, bringing together 10 Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) conferences under the common theme, "... and the word became flesh." 19. COLUMBIAN PASTOR IS 'AFRAID ALL THE TIME:' The threat — and reality — of violence lurks just beneath the surface calm of Antioquia, Colombia, says the Rev. Diego Higueta-Arango, a Presbyterian pastor in the mountainous agricultural village where he serves. "Right now is an apparent calm — the violence is more psychological than physical," Higueta told the Presbyterian News Service in a Sept. 25 interview during a break in the orientation of a dozen International Peacemakers who are preparing to itinerate in Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) congregations for the next month under the auspices of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. PORTUGUESE WOMAN IS UNLIKELY GROUND-BREAKER: Though she has felt a call to Christian vocation since the age 15, Nini Castanheira has never considered herself a trailblazer in the Presbyterian Church of Portugal. But now the former Portuguese-as-a-second-language teacher is poised to be the first Portuguese native ordained to the ministry in her small denomination. Castanheira is in the second year of a two-year internship, after which she'll be eligible for ordination. "There are more women than men in my seminary (after two years of seminary in Lisbon, Castanheira is now a student in Madrid)," she told the Presbyterian News Service in a Sept. 25 interview while here for International Peacemakers orientation. "But none of them have intended to be pastors ... until me and my colleague." Castanheira also visited the Presbytery of Northern Waters. MISSOURI RIVER VALLEY REPS TO VISIT BOHEMIA TO ADVANCE CZECH CHURCH: Columbus Day Weekend, a group of travelers from the New World will journey to the Old World — their destination: Prague, the capital of the ancient Kingdom of Bohemia now known as the Czech Republic. In that kingdom, a free people thrived in a hard-working yet comfortable lifestyle highlighted by crowning achievements in history, the arts and letters, culinary skills, music, fine arts and literature. One of its kings, Charles IV, led the secular world and the world of religion as the seat of the Holy Roman Empire. Centuries later, Jan Hus would spearhead the Christian Reform Movement. Then this proud, peaceful nation fell under the control of invaders. 23. CHRISTIANITY TODAY LOOKS AT EVANGELICAL VOTE:

Christianity Today magazine explores how evangelicals will vote in this year's presidential election in two articles that take a look at how evangelicals view both presidential candidates. Through in-depth interviews with leading evangelicals, including Ron Sider, Richard Cizik, Kirbyjon Caldwell, Jim Wallis, Tom Minnery and Tony Campolo, author John W. Kennedy looks at why many evangelicals are taking

notice of Barack Obama despite his liberal record. Kennedy says Obama has gained evangelicals' attention through his ability to speak "the language of faith comfortably" and his willingness to speak openly about his religious views, while John McCain has stayed relatively silent. But "whether evangelical voters can reconcile Obama's talk with his walk remains an open question," says Kennedy.
